Maximilien Marie Isidore Robespierre (1758 – 94) (1794) Born in 1758, died in 1794; elected a Deputy to the States-General in 1789; leader of the Extreme Left in the Assembly and one of the chief orators of the Jacobin Club; after the death of Mirabeau, his influence increasing, opposed the Girondists; became a member of the Committee of Public Safety and was closely identified with the horrors of The Reign of Terror; finally overthrown and put to death.

In the speech of 8 Thermidor, Robespierre spoke of the existence of internal enemies, conspirators, and calumniators, within the Convention and the governing Committees. On July 26th (8 Thermidor), Robespierre delivered a long and rambling speech to the Convention where he denied accusations of dictatorial conduct and self-glorification.
